Winter has been an exciting time to watch progress unfold at the Gahagan Nature Preserve. In November of last year we broke ground on the construction of an addition to Marguerite's cabin – a 2,240 square foot space with an exhibits and program area, additional restrooms which will be open year-round for visitors, and a separate activities room. As of the time of this writing the building is taking shape with the walls up, roof framed, and internal workings getting set into place. By the time this newsletter is mailed to your home, we'll have even more progress to be excited about. We expect the construction of the addition to be completed this spring, and ready for use for our summer activities.

This project has been made possible through the generous donation of Gahagan volunteer, Larry Dashner. Larry's contribution to the Preserve has helped us to grow in more ways than one; the funding for the building project, as well as operational funds that will help ensure the Preserve can be

staffed and maintained for years to come. Forest School is coming to the Gahagan Nature Preserve!

A group of parents affiliated with The Sundrop School, a nature-based Montessori school for 3 -6 year olds in Roscommon, is forming a Forest Elementary program for ages 6-9 at the Gahagan Nature Preserve for the 2025/26 school year. The mission of this program is to provide a robust, educationally rich, mixed-age learning environment for first through third graders, which immerses them in hands-on, project-based learning in nature. Children in this program will spend at least 2 hours (and up to the full day) outdoors on the Preserve each day, utilizing low to no screen-based technology. It will provide learners with experiential education in all the core subjects, while fostering their relationship with the natural world and



cultivating their role as stewards of the earth. In addition to a full day elementary program, there will likely be a half-day (afternoons only) program, depending on enrollment and interest. Coming Soon: New Trail Maps

Updated signs and trail markers are coming soon to all of our trails here at Gahagan! Many of our signs and posts are in much need of replacement. Thanks to the Roscommon County General Fund, the Weede Family Community Recreation Fund and the Roscommon County Recreation Fund through RCCF we are able to replace these with new, durable materials. Please note some changes to our trail colors when you arrive for your next hike! We plan to have signs posted after our Spring Clean-Up Day on April 26th (weather permitting).

New Bridge to Brookside

For 25 years the entrance into the Gahagan Nature Preserve from Brookside subdivision was restricted to a narrow easement. The purchase of two acres adjacent to the subdivision has allowed the Preserve to reroute the trail and construct a long lasting, safe bridge to cross Tank Creek. The bridge deck was constructed in the fall and the railing was installed over the winter. Gahagan is grateful to the Roscommon County Community Foundation for the support from the Marguerite Gahagan Nature Preserve General Fund to assist in purchasing the materials for construction of the new bridge.

Birds of the Gahagan **Nature Preserve**

Ovenbirds (Seiurus aurocapilla)

Ovenbirds (Seiurus aurocapilla) are one of the most common breeding birds found at Gahagan. It is chunky for a warbler with bold, black spots on a white breast forming streaks and a white eye ring. The back is olive green, and the crown has orange and black stripes and both sexes look alike. Ovenbirds are heard more often than seen with a loud song described as "teacher, teacher, teacher". Robert Frost wrote a poem about the bird "The Oven Bird".

Ovenbirds breed in mature broadleaf or mixed upland closed-canopy forests, the larger the better, with little underbrush and plenty of leaf-litter from the Mid-Atlantic states to northeastern British Columbia. They eat insects, primarily adult beetles and larvae, ants, caterpillars, and flies found in leaf litter, walking like miniature chickens. Their nestlings are fed beetles and larvae. The female Ovenbird builds a nest in thick leaf litter on the open forest selecting a spot under or near a small break in the canopy, often near where a tree has fallen or near regrowth from some other disturbance. She builds a domed nest with dead leaves, grass, bark, twigs; lines it with animal hair. The outside of the nest looks like an old-fashioned outdoor bread over, giving the bird their name. The female lays



4-5 white eggs with reddish-brown spots and speckles. She sits on the eggs for about 2 weeks before they hatch. The male does not incubate but occasionally brings his mate food. The young stay in the nest for 7-10 days and are fed by both parents. After leaving the nest, the fledglings are split up by the parents. The male keeps his young within the territory, and the female leads hers to a nearby area. The young become independent about a month after hatching.

Ovenbirds migrate with storm fronts on their spring and fall migration routes. Large numbers are sometimes killed as they collide with towers and tall buildings along the paths of these fronts. They arrive in Michigan from early to mid-May. In the fall, Ovenbirds head south from late August to early October, with the adults leaving before the young. Ovenbirds winter in Florida, the Caribbean, Central America, and the northern tip of South America in areas with mature forests, shade coffee trees or mangroves, on dry scrubland, and in moist upland or dry lowland forests that have leaf litter for hunting invertebrates. Those that nest east of the Appalachian Mountains tend to winter in Florida and the Caribbean and those that nest to the west winter in Central and South America.

June Bird Count

Come join us Saturday June 14, 2025, for the 15th Gahagan June Bird Count. We will meet a little before 8:00 am at the Gahagan parking lot to break into groups, then walk the trails counting all the birds we see and hear. We are usually done by 10:00 am. If you would like to participate, or just tag along for some outdoor fun, go to www.gahagannature.org/calendar. In 2024 we counted 125 individuals of 35 species in two hours. The past counts can be seen on eBird, by going to: www.ebird.org. Click on the "Explore" tab, then click on "Explore Hotspots," then type in "Marguerite Gahagan Nature Preserve."
